





Letters To The Editor

Dear Jo.

I was surprised to see that although two pages of the November issue of VN were entirely taken up by information about crime in Suffolk, there was no mention at all (nor was there in October) of two incidents that have taken place in the village recently, one of which I know to have been criminal.

Early in September I reported the anti-Islamic graffito which was stencilled onto the 30 mph road sign nearest to the Old Rectory. Eventually Stowmarket police acknowledged that this was a hate crime ("racially motivated criminal damage" they called it, though I would have said "religiously"). I did contact the clerk to the Parish Council about this and informed her that PC 421 ANELLY MILES is no longer assigned to the Felsham area but heard nothing back. I note, however that this information mustn't have got through to VN as her details still appear on the back page of the current issue.

I found the graffito offensive and thought (and still do think) that it would be a good thing to make other residents of Felsham aware of it. Eventually the graffito was painted over and now the road sign itself has gone as a result of the second incident.

On Saturday 21st October there was a serious accident just outside the village in which a young resident of Felsham was lucky to have escaped without severe injury though the car he was driving ended up on its roof. This accident involved another car which appears not to have stopped at the scene. Why hasn't this been reported in the VN? I would have thought it to have more relevance to residents than page 26 does.

In November 2016, Members of Felsham & Gedding Royal British Legion gathered in the church of St. Peter's, Felsham and joined the congregation to take part in the Remembrance Day Service, as the Branch has done since its formation back in 1946.

Members were astonished to discover that two of the pews, previously creating access difficulties when laying the wreath, had been completely removed, opening up the area of the church housing the Branch Standards and the Memorial plaques.

Members were also pleased to have WO2 Paul Kearney, 1st Battalion Royal Anglian Regiment in the congregation. Paul was asked if he would like to read the names of the fallen and recite the Legion exhortation at the 2017 service, which he agreed to do.

Following the 2016 service, Members were asked if they would like to do something to smarten up the area.

This was discussed at a number of Branch meetings and, numerous thoughts discarded, knowing that any wall fixtures within the church would prove difficult to gain the necessary permission.

Following a number of thought processes and costings, we were finally able to put our proposals to the Parochial Council in late summer of 2017 which, thankfully, they were agreed to, pending some minor adjustments.

Work began in earnest, as the ambition was to have everything in place for November 2017. Michael Kinsey set out to research all the names of those mentioned on the Memorials, binding them into a legible folder.

Karen Fynn began (and probably wished she hadn't started) to make the church kneeler and spent hours of work doing so.

Tina Smith and I began searching for suitable carpet colours and textures to create the Legion carpet, which was expertly bound by Tracey Hempstead, a local volunteer.

Eventually, a couple of weeks before the service, everything came together and was placed into the appropriate area.

We now have a Legion coloured carpet, leading to a donated drop leaf table in memory of Ron Norman, supporting the book of Remembrance on an angled lectern, together with framed documents bearing the Laurence Binyon poem and meaning of the Standard, with the Legion Kneeler placed at the front.

Happily, to date, we have only heard complimentary comments and hope that this work will be appreciated by all who witness it.

This is a perfect example of how the community can work together in achieving a common goal.

I am pleased to say that, since 2016, Paul Kearney has transferred his Central Royal British Legion Membership to Felsham & Gedding Branch and was, therefore, fittingly able to carry out his Remembrance Day duties in the church at this years' Service. It really is a privilege to have a serving member of H.M. Armed Forces participating in this most important event in our calendar.

I would like, on behalf of the Branch, to thank the Parochial Council most kindly, for agreeing and allowing us to produce this display and trust that many will enjoy the scene over the years to come.





LEARN HOW TO MAKE REAL BEER

Brewing your own beer is easy, enjoyable and can save you money.

Perhaps human civilisation was founded on beer. This may be a far-fetched claim perhaps, but apparently there's evidence to back it up. Around 16,000 years ago, our ancestors first started to cultivate grain. And, at the same point in our history, the first beers were starting to appear, probably made from that very grain. These beers were developed by the Sumerians, who lived in what is now southern Iraq.



Such beverages were crude compared to modern standards and, served in vast jugs; they were drunk through reed straws as the beer in the jug was still fermenting.

Around 10,000BC, the first written 'words' were appearing on clay tablets – among them a first recipe for a sort of bread that can also be made into a beer. Thus, one of the first recorded writings in human history was for homebrew. Note this last word!



Although the brewing process has become more sophisticated, the enjoyment derived from sharing a batch of homemade beer with friends remains reassuringly the same thousands of years later.

So why brew your own beer? For many homebrewers, it's the cost. I understand the average

cost of a pub pint in the UK is between £3 and £4 depending where you live. Home brewed beer costs circa 50p a pint. A no-brainer in my view.

Homebrew is arguably better for you and lower in calories than any mass-produced beer. It doesn't contain any additives and you know exactly what's gone into it.

Also there is great satisfaction to be had from using home-grown or foraged ingredients. They are natural, local and sustainable. And from an environmental perspective, to reuse a barrel or bottle five or more times is far better for the planet than a new bottle for every beer, even if you only consider the carbon dioxide released through distribution. Its joy all round.

BREWING INGREDIENTS: BASICS

Hops

Hops are the flowers of the hop vine; you can find them in the Felsham and Gedding hedgerows from late August to early September. In the wild, the vine will climb trees, reaching 4m (13ft) or more. Commercially and on some allotments, hops are grown up long, sturdy poles and the whole vine is harvested.



Hops add bitterness to the wort and aroma to the final beer, which would otherwise be too sweet-tasting. Using hops originally caught on because they inhibit the growth of bacteria.

Yeast

Yeast is a micro-organism that is actually a fungus. It feeds on sugar, so when added to a sugar solution, as with making beer, it will multiply and do so until it has eaten all the available sugar, producing alcohol in the process. It will then die off, leaving sediment.



Malt

Malted grains are grains that have been allowed to germinate before the germination is halted with hot air. This turns the grain's starches into the sugars needed for the fermentation process. Felsham and Gedding are in an area well known for growing these grains and are only a few miles from a major producer of malt and home brew kits: Muntons of Stowmarket.



EQUIPMENT: THE ESSENTIALS

The one off costs of setting your homebrew up and running is where most of the costs come in. But with a bit of foraging, or adding to the Christmas list, it is possible to bring the cost down. The basic equipment you'll need is listed below: (my personal preference is underlined):

- A <u>plastic fermenter with tap</u> or fermentation bucket that holds 50 pints (30l). Or forage a food-grade bucket from a local restaurant they are often thrown away. It is worth permanently marking this with actual measurements. Costs circa £15
- 2. Bung and air-lock. Costs circa £3
- 3. A long-handled plastic spoon for stirring. Costs circa £1.50
- 4. A <u>40-pint (22I) pressure barrel</u> ideally with an S-30 pressure valve £25-£35+ or strong beer bottles. You'll need 40 or so. (Once used beer or plastic PET bottles can be used). Cost circa £30 My preference is the barrel as it is less fiddly although you will also need a CO₂ pressure cylinder £20 (refill£10) or soda stream cylinder to use with the barrel.



- 5. A 2-3m (6½-10ft) length of clear plastic tube is used to siphon the beer into bottles once it has fully fermented. Cost ranges from £2- £5
- 6. Sterilising powder. Cost circa £5
- 7. Hydrometer useful for measuring alcohol content but not essential. (I don't have one).
- 8. Heating belt for fermenter- useful but not essential
- 9. Measuring jug and funnel Cost circa £7.
- Bottle capper and caps a simple lever for crimping bottle tops on to your beer bottles. Costs circa £5-£30 depending on what you buy.



This will put the total equipment start-up costs at either £44 to £100+ (if you go down the barrel route) and from £12 to £100+ (if you go down the bottle route). You can however get a barrel or bottle start-up kit including a beer kit for £60-£70

You can buy all these items from homebrew outlets, health food shops or on line. They make perfect Christmas presents!



Cinnamon Bread Stars

The smell of these baking will definitely bring Christmas to mind!

Ingredients:

Makes 32



Method:

Preheat the oven to 160C/gas mark 3.

Mix together the flour, sugar and spices in a bowl. Rub the butter into the mixture with the ends of your fingers until it resembles breadcrumbs.

Beat the egg and syrup together in a jug.

Make a well in the middle of the flour mix and add the egg mix. Mix together with a knife and then your hands until you get a ball of soft dough.

Wrap in cling film and pop in the fridge for at least 1 hour.

Roll out until about 1/2cm thick. Cut out about 32 biscuits with a star cutter. Place on a lined baking sheet and bake for 12-15 minutes, until golden brown.

Cool on a rack. Dust with icing sugar and ground cinnamon.





