Felsham and Gedding W.I. February 2019 Meeting.

On a rather chilly evening a very full house was present for the February Meeting and the topic was to be *Behind the Scene at Wimbledon*.

The President dealt with the business side and we were then introduced to Peter Jackson, a resident of Cockfield, previously of Wimbledon and member of The All England Lawn Tennis Club. During his time he had served on various committees at the Club therefore was able to impart some fascinating facts and figures. Mainly about the acquisition of land and development of the site to the Wimbledon we know well from coverage of The Championships there each year.

He proved to be an engaging speaker with a twinkle in his eye especially when large sums of money were mentioned which drew a few gasps from the assembled members.

The Club was founded on 23 July 1868 as The All England Croquet Club. Its name was changed in 1877 to The All England Croquet and Lawn Tennis Club and in 1899 to The All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club.

The Wimbledon Foundation was founded in 2013 with the aim of benefitting people in the local community, local charities, schools and partner organisations like Water Aid .The amount of money raised is substantial, derived from ticket sales and all the associated undertakings of the AELTC and The Championships.

Local schools are provided with a chance for children to play on the grass courts. There is also The Road to Wimbledon Championships held for juniors under 14. This was a fascinating insight into what goes on year round behind the green and purple of that famous symbol and The All England Club.



Just a few more snippets for you.

- The grass is steamed!! I think this is done 4 times a year. An idea from the
 Dutch but apparently has proved very successful.
- Ball boys/girls are recruited from local schools and apparently they never fail to get a job afterwards. Discipline pays handsomely!
- The catering staff swells to 2000 during the Championships.
- The Lawn Tennis Association receives a large chunk of money from the All England Club.

It certainly had been a behind the scene talk which was greatly enjoyed by all.

Committee members were encouraged to produce their own round and either used their professional expertise or an interest to compile their questions. The hall was full and with a good turn out from our own Felsham and Gedding-ites, plus Thorpe Morieux (again), and even a contingent from New Zealand, we filled the hall easily. I think it important to note that the Kiwis' ultimate victory may be down to the fact that one of their teammembers was responsible for compiling one of the quiz rounds which happened to be about...New Zealand! New rules and regs in place for this year, I think! Thanks go to Adrian King for doing a fantastic job as quizmaster.

I was lucky when it came to organising and running both of our main fund-raising events, in that we had a wealth of experience in the committee; and indeed it was a very calming influence. The experience manifested itself in the smooth preparation and running of the now ubiquitous family fun-day; both weather-wise and bank balance-wise it was a great success. The weather was scorching and the turnout was good, which helped us turn over a significant profit.

The long, hot summer soon turned to autumn and Bonfire night soon rolled around. Despite a lower turnout, coupled with a small loss on the books, we considered the event a success. 

Thorpe Morieux and District Gardening Club.

For the first meeting of the year held in Thorpe Village Hall on 21st January the Thorpe Morieux and District Gardening Club held a talk given by Mr Simon White who is the head gardener for Peter Beales Roses of Attleborough. Simon delivered an excellent illustrated talk entitled "The A -Z of Roses" where he was able to give a rose variety beginning with each letter of the Alphabet. He generously gave the members a copy of the Peter Beales catalogue to help with the identification of the many varieties of Roses available.

Simon also showed pictures of their famous award-winning displays held at the Chelsea and Hampton Court flower shows and this clearly indicated how some varieties are best viewed from above while some tend to produce hanging flower heads.

Simons gardening tips were also quite helpful regarding the need for regular watering and feeding. However, he did stress the need to discuss with experts



before acquiring a rose plant since the type of soil was quite important as well as the climatic conditions since some roses not native to this country may need more warmth etc. Also, when considering plant selection, it is important to be aware that roses take on several growing styles i.e. Shrub, Bush, Climbing, Rambling some have one flush of blooms while others bloom continuously if regularly dead headed. Simon stressed that some varieties should not be dead headed since they produce some beautiful Rose Hips. Together with all of this there are such things as colour, size of bloom, shape of bloom and of course the all-important Scent.



The rose plants grown at Attleborough are all field grown by budding the various varieties on to growing root stock and the process of producing a plant for sale takes about 2 years. At the appropriate time they are dug up and sold in dry root form but can be sold in containers if required. Simon brought several plants along for sale and was able to advise on the next step in planting in the owner's garden.

The Club Chairman, Glynis Wash, thanked the speaker for such splendid evening and this was responded to with a warm burst of applause. Simon invited all to the garden centre where they could meet the gardeners and receive free advice as well as enjoy a walk through the flower beds. Here they also grow some companion plants there is also a tea room for refreshments if required.

And just in-case we get some cooler weather why not give this a try, it's one of our favourites.

Slow cooker chicken casserole

Ingredients

knob of butter

½ tbsp rapeseed or olive oil

1 large onion, finely chopped

11/2 tbsp flour

650g boneless, skinless chicken thigh fillets

3 garlic cloves, crushed

400g baby new potatoes, halved

2 sticks celery, diced

2 carrots, diced

250g mushrooms, guartered

15g dried porcini mushroom, soaked in 50ml boiling water (optional)

500ml stock made with 2 chicken stock cubes

2 tsp Dijon mustard, plus extra to serve

2 bay leaves

Method

Heat a knob of butter and $\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp rapeseed or olive oil in a large frying pan, cook 1 finely chopped large onion for 8-10 mins until softened and starting to caramelise.

Meanwhile, put 1½ tbsp flour and a little salt and pepper in a bowl and toss 650g boneless, skinless chicken thigh fillets in it.

Add 3 crushed garlic cloves and the chicken to the pan and cook for 4-5 mins more until the chicken is starting to brown.

Transfer to your slow cooker, along with 400g halved baby new potatoes, 2 diced celery sticks, 2 diced carrots, 250g quartered mushrooms, 15g dried and soaked porcini mushrooms with the 50ml soaking liquid, 500ml chicken stock, 2 tsp Dijon mustard and 2 bay leaves.

Give it a good stir. Cook on Low for 7 hours or High for 4 hours.

Dear Friends,

Lent will soon be upon us – Ash Wednesday is on 6th March, so get your pancakes ready for Tuesday 5th March!

The Church of England has produced a beautiful booklet of daily reflections to be used through Lent on the Beatitudes. The Beatitudes are sayings of Jesus – he spoke these to the crowds that gathered to hear him speak at what is now known as the 'Sermon on the Mount'. They are Jesus describing what the citizens of God's kingdom should look like. They speak of the Christian vision for the world, a world where justice, peace and love reign over all. In most versions of the bible the beatitudes speak of people being 'blessed', but I quite like the version from the Common English Bible, which talks about people being 'happy'.

"Happy are people who are hopeless, because the kingdom of heaven is theirs.

Happy are people who grieve, because they will be made glad.

Happy are people who are humble, because they will inherit the earth.

Happy are people who are hungry and thirsty for righteousness, because they will be fed until they are full.

Happy are people who show mercy, because they will receive mercy. Happy are people who have pure hearts, because they will see God. Happy are people who make peace, because they will be called God's children.

Happy are people whose lives are harassed because they are righteous, because the kingdom of heaven is theirs."

What we learn from these is that we are happy when we know our need for God, when we weep with compassion for the needs of the world, when we share God's longing for justice and peace, and when we clothe ourselves in mercy and grace.

A challenge for us all!

Growing Vegetables was the title of the February meeting of The Thorpe Morieux and District Gardening Club. Mr Mike Able came along and delivered an interesting talk on the subject based on a lifetime's interest in gardening together with skills developed when teaching this subject together with his work with a Company specialising in materials to control garden pests.

Mikes presentation tended to be on why we should grow vegetables rather than the use of any special techniques. He did, however, stress the importance of good soil structure which cannot be changed but can be improved by the use of added organic matter (compost) and fertilisers to give added nutrients. Raised beds might be a good alternative to be filled with your desired soil structure but this could be quite expensive.

Early growth could be improved, Mike explained, by the use of plant covering. the use of Polythene gave good soil warmth not unlike a greenhouse but was prone to condensation producing fungal growths. Fleece, he felt, was a good proposition and this could be obtained in various thicknesses. Also available was a range netting principally to reduce insect damage. Care should be taken when disposing of such materials.

Growing your own vegetables had several advantages such as Freshness and good Flavour together with the enjoyable and healthy exercise of gardening. Also just grow what you like depending on your soil structure e.g. Carrots do not do well in clay type or stony soil. Crops such as Squashes, Salad leaves and broad beans etc are easy and satisfying to grow but cauliflowers, carrots and onions from seed can be problematic and require much space. Another advantage of grow your own is that you only need to harvest just what you need and do not have a storage problem. Leeks, parsnips and sprouts can be more difficult to grow and they also take up more space but you only harvest according to need. Storage can be a problem when all of the crop is lifted. Potatoes, onions and some carrots can be stored in a cool garage and others can perhaps held briefly in a refrigerator and some may be frozen.



Thanked by the club chairman, Glynis Wash, our speaker was invited to judge this month's club competition which was to produce a vase of Winter Botanic Display from the garden. This produced a good entry probably due to the season's milder climate. The display from club member Hilde Crapnell was considered a worthy winner.
