AGM 09.02.2021 - Chair's Report

2020 is the year I think we'd all like to forget. Stuck at home and unable to enjoy the company and community that the playing field so often provides, it would be easy to think that the committee has assumed a dormant status. The reality, however, has been much different.

Last year's AGM was held earlier than usual, in the hope that we would be able to encourage more folk from both villages to join and help refresh a rapidly diminishing committee. Alas, we did not get the turnout we had hoped for, and have subsequently had to manage without a full-time secretary this year. In addition, we were without a dedicated treasurer for much of the year, until Jo Tavernor very kindly offered to step back into the role.

With the committee in an already difficult situation, it had been proposed before Christmas 2019 that we should postpone the Annual Family fun-day for 2020 due to the lack of full-time committee members needed to manage the organisation. The poor turnout at the AGM only cemented that decision – a move that we rather cynically hoped might stir up some realisation in the community. Events, however, were soon overtaken by the Covid-19 situation, and much to my dismay, we lost our element of shock. Instead, we had to focus on a new threat.

It was with a great deal of sadness that we had to fence off the play equipment during the first lockdown. In line with local government advice, it was important to prevent transmission between children and adults. We have taken a more cautious approach since then. Users of the site and equipment are reminded of the need for good hygiene and public awareness.

Amidst the doom and gloom, however, work has continued as per normal, and there have been some successes this year. Our socially-distanced work parties have kept the playing field in good condition. And we have successfully implemented the second phase of tree planting at the far end of the site – my thanks go to all the committee members for their time.

In addition, we now have a plan to replace the roof on the rather forlorn looking youth shelter, and we hope finally to have a dedicated storage facility constructed beyond the car park in the coming year.

As you'll see from our treasurer's report, there have been few outgoings this year, so we end the year in a good place financially.

All that remains is for me to thank the committee members for their time and effort, as ever, and also to remind everyone that we *really do* need some more people to join up as committee members going forward if we're to stay afloat.

Response to Petition

I would like to thank the 190 residents of Felsham who signed the petition regarding the road safety concerns along Church Road in front of the Six Bells pub by the developers' proposal to place edge of carriageway markings to narrow the road in order to claim a safer exit for the new houses in the pubs gardens. Jo Churchill MP visited Felsham to see for herself the concerns and sent a letter to SCC Highways and BMSDC Planning supporting our concerns and requested a meeting to discuss the issue. The petition was sent to SCC Highways and BMSDC Planning and was registered as an official petition for investigation. The email below is the official response from SCC Highways to Jo Churchill's letter and the petition. It appears that the safety concerns of Felsham residents are being ignored in favour of the developers' proposals. I am still waiting for a date for a "virtual" meeting with Highways. If anyone has any suggestions on what else we can do to keep our village roads safe please contact me.

Dear Jo

Thank you for your letter regarding the road layouts at Felsham and the related planning application for three houses. I am responding on behalf of myself and Mark Ash. I will restrict my comments to the matters you raise relating to the Highway Authority, rather than issues relating to the fabric of our villages or the planning process.

Firstly, I would like to reassure you that I and officers take these matters very seriously, and do take issues in the round. Clearly, a request for a comment from the Highway Authority for an article in the local paper can only provide a snapshot of our overall consideration, and should not be seen as our detailed examination of the issues.

At this time, we are naturally restricting our site visits, particularly face-to-face meetings. However, while it is both acceptable and necessary in some instances to undertake a desktop exercise to examine planning applications, I can confirm that a senior officer has indeed visited the site to view the matters first hand.

All applications have to be assessed proportionately and, for a development of this size, it would be unreasonable to expect an applicant to provide a traffic survey, as the number of vehicles the development will generate would not be significant. We have no reason to doubt the local survey indicating around 1,000 movements a day; however this does not change our considered view.

Turning to the matter of the road width, there may be some misunderstanding what this is for and what the implications are. The current access is considered sub-standard due to the lack of visibility. As there would be intensification of use during the peak hour, better visibility for the access is required. The splays indicated on the drawing, supplied by the applicant, show an acceptable visibility is achievable over highway verges. The proposed road markings indicate a more obvious edge of carriageway than is there currently and allow vehicles for the new dwellings and for customers of the public house to safely exit the access. It is also considered the introduction of the road markings will act as traffic calming at this location, as the perceived road width is narrower, including when cars are not parked on the opposite side of the road. This is also a benefit given the lack of footway

outside the pub and street-lighting in the area. It should be noted that the actual highway width is not reduced, nor do the markings prevent vehicles pulling over to give way to oncoming traffic if required, and it is safe to do so.

As a statutory consultee, Suffolk County Council are consulted as the Highway Authority as well as in other duties, for example as Lead Flood Authority and as the Fire and Rescue Authority. These are in relation to a technical response in that capacity, and it would not be feasible or appropriate for us to consult on our consultation response. However, our responses are a matter of public record and, once submitted, are available publicly for anyone to view and comment, and provide their own response to the Local Planning Authority. If there are issues raised by other parties that the LPA require clarification on before making a decision, they will contact us to address this.

I hope this assures you of our serious and considered view of this and other development matters. As mentioned above, we are reluctant to undertake face-to-face visits in the current situation, but would be happy to have a virtual meeting.

Help to shape future plans of West Suffolk Hospital

As the plans for a new hospital for West Suffolk get underway it is important that as many people are involved in developing the proposals as possible.

The vision for the West Suffolk NHS Foundation Trust (WSFT) project is to ensure the way that health services are delivered is fit for the local population's current and future needs and the team need your help to do that. The new facility is for West Suffolk people and is to be designed by West Suffolk people.

The project team are establishing a Co-production Community Engagement Group (CCEG) which will help shape the public engagement around the hospital redevelopment.

WSFT are looking for community members who have an interest in hospital services which will add an additional dimension to the redevelopment proposals.

The work will get increasingly detailed as the project progresses over the next couple of years and there will be many aspects where the team will benefit from the input of members from the CCEG.

The group will meet on a monthly basis and, due to the current climate, these meetings will be hosted on Microsoft Teams. It is important that there is a good representation across the group at each meeting and the opportunity to attend will be offered to as many people as possible who apply.



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
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Recipe Corner

From 'Royal Spread – The Cook book' by the Friends of the Theatre Royal in Bury St Edmunds.

Chicken Tikka

1½ lb chicken breasts
3 tbsp yoghurt
1½ tsp paprika
ground coriander
ground cumin

garlic powder ½ tsp mango powder ¼ tsp orange food colouring powder (optional)

Cube chicken. Combine the marinade spices with the yoghurt then mix into the chicken. Cover and place in the fridge for 4-6 hours or overnight. When it is marinaded, cook in the microwave on wooden skewers which have been soaked in cold water for half an hour. Grill or barbecue to brown before serving. Serve with salad as Chicken Tikka.

Tikka Masala

Cook the chicken after it has been marinaded, using the same marinade as for Chicken Tikka. While the chicken is cooking have the sauce ready for Masala.

1 cup puréed onions

1 tbsp each puréed garlic and ginger

4 tbsp ghee or vegetable oil

2 tomatoes, chopped

1 tbsp tomato purée

1 tbsp tomato sauce

1 tbsp ground almonds

3 tbsp double cream

2 tbsp fresh coriander, chopped

salt to taste

1 tsp cumin seeds, white

1 tsp mustard seeds, black

Fry cumin seeds and mustard seeds in hot oil or ghee for a couple of minutes. Add the onion, ginger and garlic purée, then add the tomatoes, tomato purée and sauce. Simmer for 5-10 mins or until the tomatoes are cooked. Add the cream, ground almonds and fresh coriander. Add the cooked chicken pieces. Mix well. The sauce should be of good consistency. Garnish with fresh coriander and flaked almonds. Serve with basmati rice and nan bread.
